

### Addressing Policy 174, 2019

**District of Lake Country** 

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#### Date

The following was adopted as Policy by **Resolution No.** 19.09.268 at the **Regular Council Meeting** held **September 17, 2019.** 

Address Change Reimbursement Policy No. 08.99 and all amendments thereto are hereby repealed. Lake Country Road Naming Policy No. 08.98 and all amendments thereto are hereby repealed.

#### **Purpose**

This Policy shall guide the **Director** in assigning **addressing numbers** and ensuring that the appropriate number plates are installed, in order to maintain a complete and consistent civic addressing system within the District. In addition, it will ensure that natural attributes, flora and fauna, wildlife and historical influences of the community are recognized through road naming.

#### **Definitions**

The following words apply:

"Address Grids" means the Address Grids on the District of Lake Country's Geographic Information System.

"Address Number" means the number of a property which is used, or intended to be used, as part of the address for the property.

"Director" means the Director of Community Development or their designate.

#### Policy

#### 1.0 GENERAL


- 1.1 No person shall display, or permit the displaying of, any **address number** on a parcel other than the number currently assigned pursuant to this Policy.
- 1.2 The Director may, at any time and as deemed necessary, designate the address number, re-designate an address number or assign a series of address numbers to any parcel or building, or part thereof.
- 1.3 Where the District initiates a road name change or address change, the District will compensate affected property owners and businesses pursuant to the following:
  - a) Property owners whose address will change as a result of a District-initiated road name or address change will be reimbursed for the cost of one six-month 'Change of Address' with Canada Post.
  - b) Business owners whose address will change as a result of a District-initiated road name or address change and who have a valid business licence as of the date of initial notification by the District will be reimbursed for the cost of one four-month 'Change of Address' with Canada Post, and up to \$100 for stationery costs.

c) Property owners and/or business owners will also be reimbursed up to \$25 for the cost of replacement exterior address numbers.


1.4 Original invoices must be provided to the District in order to claim and receive reimbursement.

#### 2.0 ASSIGNING OF ADDRESS NUMBERS

- 2.1. The **Director** shall designate the **address number** upon:
  - a) Registration of a subdivision creating three (3) or more parcels (excluding the parent parcel); or
    - i. the parent parcel may also be assigned a new address number pursuant to this Policy.
  - b) Issuance of a building permit for existing parcels.
- 2.2. The **address number** assigned shall allow for expansion to accommodate future growth in the area.
- 2.3. A particular address number shall not be unused for any reason (ex. 13, 44, 69, or 666).
- 2.4. One address number shall be assigned per parcel, except where otherwise permitted in this Policy.
- 2.5. An area with an established **address number** pattern shall continue to use that numbering pattern.
- 2.6. The address grids shall be used to determine the address number.
- 2.7. Address numbers shall increase sequentially Northward on all streets generally running North-South. (See Figure 1)
- 2.8. Address numbers shall increase sequentially Eastward on all streets generally running West-East. (See Figure 1)
- 2.9. Parcels on North and West sides of streets shall have even numbers. (See Figure 1)
- 2.10. Parcels on the South and East sides of streets shall have odd numbers. (See Figure 1)



- 2.11. For streets with only one exit each parcel shall be assigned an **address number** beginning at the street access and following the **Address Grids**.
- 2.12. For streets curved but generally in one direction shall have the curve ignored and each parcel be assigned **address numbers** in accordance with their general direction.
- 2.13. For parcels on a corner lot an **address number** shall be assigned in accordance with the street which the approved driveway access location is on.
- 2.14. All single detached housing units and mobile homes shall be assigned one (1) address number.
- 2.15. All permitted additional single detached housing units or mobile homes on a parcel shall be assigned a separate address number.
- 2.16. All permitted secondary suites and accessory suites shall be assigned the same **address number** as the principal dwelling with the additional identifier of "A" (ex. 12345A Smith Road).
- 2.17. All duplex housing and semi-detached housing (see Figure 2) shall be assigned one (1) **address number** for each unit.



- 2.18. All row housing and stacked row housing shall be assigned one (1) address number for each unit providing all the approved driveway accesses face a public right-of-way. If one or more driveway accesses face other than a public right-of-way, only one (1) address number shall be assigned per parcel and one (1) unit number shall be assigned per unit (ex. Unit 1, 12345 Jane Street).
- 2.19. All commercial and industrial buildings shall be assigned one (1) address number for each unit providing all the approved driveway accesses face a public right-of-way. If one or more driveway accesses face other than a public right-of-way, only one (1) address number shall be assigned per parcel and one (1) unit number shall be assigned per unit (ex. Unit 1, 12345 Jane Street).
- 2.20. All buildings with units on more than more one floor shall be assigned an **address number** for each unit in an increasing numeric order and in a clockwise manner from the main entrance (see Figure 3).

- 2.21. A parcel containing a mobile home park shall be assigned one (1) address number and one (1) unit number shall be assigned per unit.
- 2.22. Pre-addressing shall be completed for:
  - a) subdivisions creating three (3) or more parcels (excluding the parent parcel) that have received an approved preliminary lot layout; and
  - b) strata/multi-unit developments creating three (3) or more units.
- 2.23. Prior to pre-addressing the owner shall provide the **Director** with a copy of the key plan that identifies the lot numbers.
  - a) In the case of strata lots the strata lot numbers shall correspond with the assigned **address numbers**.

#### 3.0 STANDARDS FOR ADDRESS NUMBERS

3.1 Every owner shall place and maintain the designated **address number**, on a contrasting background and of a size in conformance with Table 3.1.1 on the building in a place that is easily visible from the road.

- 3.2 If a single family dwelling is on a corner lot, the **address number** shall be displayed facing the street named in the address.
  - a) For all other buildings on a corner lot, the **address** number shall be displayed on each façade facing a street, in addition to the front entrance of the building.

#### 3.3 Address numbers shall be:

- a) in plain block numerals, not script or written;
- b) made of durable waterproof materials; and
- c) affixed to the building so as to not be easily removed.
- 3.4 No person shall affix the address number to any utility pole or to any District property.

Where landscaping or other structures obscure the visibility of a building from the road, the owner shall erect on the building property within sight of the road, a sign meeting the requirements for a 0-15m building setback from road, but not exceeding 0.4m² total area.

#### 4.0 ASSIGNING OF ROAD NAMES

- 4.1 In selecting a name for municipal roads, consideration will be given to local geography, local natural habitat and local history of the municipality or neighbourhood constituency area.
- 4.2 All roads shall be designated as a street, road, drive, crescent, lane, place or other "type" of road based on standard urban planning practices as determined by the **Director**.
- 4.3 Road names shall be chosen from a list of names (attached as Schedule "A") that have been provided to the District from community organizations and District Committees and Commissions.
- 4.4 Prior to amending Schedule A by adding additional names and prior to final approval of selected road names, the proposed names shall be referred to utility agencies, 911 Dispatch and the Central Okanagan Regional District in order to avoid duplication and conflict.
- 4.5 District Committees, Commissions and community organizations will periodically be solicited for new names to add to Schedule A, and the additions included by Council amendment to this policy.

4.7 The Approving Officer will ensure that road names that are part of a subdivision plan have been approved pursuant to policy.
